August Birthstone - Peridot

For those who were born in the month of August the Peridot is the traditional birthstone. The August birthstone properties include love, truth, faithfulness and loyalty. The Peridot is also used to enhance prosperity, growth, and openness.

Where are Peridots found?

Olivine, of which peridot is a type, is a common material in mafic and ultramafic rocks, and it is often found in lavas, and in peridotite xenoliths of the mantle, which lavas carry to the surface; but gem quality peridot only occurs in a fraction of these settings.

Peridot can also be found in meteorites.

Olivine in general is a very abundant material, but gem quality material is rather rare.

Peridot olivine is mined in the U.S. at North Carolina, Arizona on the San Carlos

Reservation, Hawaii, Nevada, and New Mexico at Kilbourne Hole; Egypt, Australia, Brazil, China, Kenya, Mexico, Myanmar (Burma), Norway, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Sri Lanka, and Tanzania.

The Color of the Peridot

The traditional color associated with the Peridot is the lime green color and is a popular gem used in jewelry. The meaning of colors through the ages represented many aspects of life.

Social, religious, biblical and Christian symbolism were all reflected in the color green. The symbolic meaning of the color green was renewal of life and nature. The best Peridot is a stone with a sparkling lime green color, without a brownish or olive cast. The color of the peridot can range from lime, yellowish green, olive green or medium dark green.

Definition of the Peridot

The word Peridot is derived from the Greek word "faridat " which means "gem". The peridot (pronounced pear-a-doe) is a pale green variety of chrysolite and used as a gemstone. The crystal structure of the Peridot (magnesium iron silicate) is orthorhombic. The Peridot is one of the few gemstones that come in only one color. The depth of green depends on how much iron is contained in the crystal structure.

It is also often referred to as the "poor man's emerald".

Uncomplicated, but not for the cutter

Peridot is not particularly hard—only 6.5 to 7 on the Mohs scale— but it is easy to look after and fairly robust. Peridot cat's eyes and star peridot are particularly rare and precious.

The peridot is cut in accordance with its crystal shape, mostly faceted or in classical table cuts, or round, antique, as an octahedron or oval. Smaller crystals are cut in standardized series stones, larger ones as one-offs. Cabochons are made if the material contains more inclusions for the domed cut brings out the fine, silky shine of the inclusions at their best.

The cutters know full well that this gemstone is anything but easy to work with. The raw crystals can be very tricky and may crack easily. There is often a good deal of tension on the inside of the crystal. But once the cutter has succeeded in removing the coarser inclusions, the peridot is a precious stone with good wearing qualities which does not call for any special care.

Membership Report


Membership Drive will begin next month, so watch for the application form in the September newsletter.


