
Paul and I have gone to check the mail several times at the Caldwell Post Office. We have received 13 memberships which we dropped off to Kim Bashford (Membership) for processing.

USEFUL ITEMS TO BRING ON YOUR TRIP

Buckets, Shovels, Rock Hammer, Pick (Large and Small), Sieve, Gloves, Spray Bottle for Water, Small Scrub Brush, Knee Pads, Magnifier, Plenty of Drinking Water, Food, Appropriate Clothing, Protective Eyewear, Sun Protection, Day Pack or Back Pack, Umbrella, Pry Bar, Tick Spray, First Aid Kit, Shovel and fire extinguisher to put out any fires that may start.

Trips can last most of the day.

Generally, a High-Clearance vehicle and sometimes 4WD or an ATV is required.

Remember, when you are finished, fill in all holes that are dug at the site.

My Favorite—Mica

I have always been intrigued with mica. So this month I decided to learn more about it.

Mica

Mica is a mineral name given to a group of minerals that are physically and chemically similar. They are all silicate minerals, known as sheet

silicates because they form in distinct layers because of its excellent cleavage. These tough, flexible sheets are the distinguishing characteristic of the mineral group. Micas are fairly light and relatively soft. Thin sheets are transparent or, if colored, translucent. Micas are stable when exposed to electricity, light, moisture and extreme temperatures.

Mica is heat-resistant and does not conduct electricity.

There are 37 different mica minerals. The most common include: purple lepidolite, black biotite, brown phlogopite and clear muscovite.

Mica was first mined in India about 4,000 years ago, where it was used primarily in medicines. The Mayans used it for decorative effect in stucco to make their temples sparkle in the sun. Today it is used in everything from electrical products to makeup.

Mohs hardness: 2.5-4 (lepidolite); 2.5-3 biotite; 2.5-3 phlogopite; 2-2.5 muscovite

The mica industry can be divided into two distinct but interdependent industries: those that produce sheet or block mica, and those that produce flake mica.

Sheet mica is no longer mined in the U.S. because of the high cost of mining, the small market, and the high capital risk. Most sheet mica is mined in India, where labor costs are comparatively low.

Flake mica produced in the U.S. comes from several sources: schist as a by-product of processing feldspar and kaolin resources, from placer deposits, and from pegmatites. It is mined by conventional open-pit methods. In soft residual material, dozers, shovels, scrapers and front-end loaders are used in the mining process. North Carolina's production accounts for half of total U.S. mica production. Hard-rock mining of mica-bearing ore requires drilling and blasting.

The principal use of ground mica is in gypsum wallboard joint compound. In the paint industry, ground mica is used as a pigment extender. The plastic industry used ground mica as an extender, filler and as a reinforcing agent. The rubber industry uses ground mica as a filler and as a mold lubricant in the manufacture of molded rubber products, including tires.

Sheet mica is used principally in the electronic and electrical industries. The major uses of sheet and block mica are as electrical insulators in electronic equipment.



Treasurer: An update on the banking accounts was given along with a list of bills that have been paid.

New Business: The January General Meeting is cancelled. COVID-19 guidelines will be reviewed in February and a decision will be made about having the February meeting at that time. The next Board Meeting will be January 25, 2021 at the Elks Lodge in Caldwell.
