OWYHEE GEM & MINERAL SOCIETY GENERAL MEETING MINUTES 17 NOVEMBER 2021

The OGMS General Meeting was called to order at 07:10pm at Boone Hall, College of Idaho campus, Caldwell, Idaho by **President Willa Renken**. All members and visitors were given a warm welcome. Roxanne Franklin made the motion to accept the minutes as printed in the newsletter; Ed Moser seconded; motion passed.

Howard Emry gave a presentation on his 'favorite fossil', *Megalonyx Jeffersonii*... the Giant Ground Sloth. (Megalonyx is Greek for 'great claw' and *Jeffersonii* refers to Thomas Jefferson, who presented his observations of some of these bones to the American Philosophical Society in March of 1797.) Howard shared his discovery of the bones (as well as the story of the excavation) of a nearly complete skeleton on the shore of American Falls Reservoir, that resides in the Idaho Museum of Natural History at ISU in Pocatello. Thank you, Howard, for sharing what is obviously a lifelong passion!

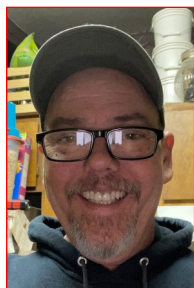

December Birthstone—Turquoise

The traditional birthstone for December is brilliant blue Turquoise and the December birthstone color is blue. There are in fact three official December birthstones -Turquoise, Tanzanite and Blue Zircon, with Blue Topaz as the alternative December gemstone.



Other birthday symbols include the birth flowers for December which are the Narcissus (Daffodil) and the Poinsettia.

Besides being meaningful December birthday gifts, Turquoise jewelry is the gift to celebrate an 11th wedding anniversary and Tanzanite jewelry for a 24th anniversary.

The name *Turquoise* comes from 'pierre turquoise' which means 'stone of Turkey' so called when the stone was brought to Europe from Turkish bazaars.

According to legends the Turquoise stone symbolizes success, happiness and prosperity.

Turquoise is formed by groundwater containing copper that has seeped into the bedrock. Reactions with other minerals over time form an opaque stone of stunning shades of blues and greens. The dark lines and shapes seen in turquoise are derived from the surrounding rock, known as *matrix*. Beautiful blue-green Turquoise is one of the earliest gemstones to be cast in jewelry since ancient times.

Rare violet-blue **Tanzanite** was recently discovered in the 1960's and the only known deposit is in northern Tanzania.

Sparkling **Zircon** has been used in jewelry for over 2000 years and is available in many colors, the most popular being blue Zircon.



Blue Topaz is the alternative birthstone for December and also a very popular gemstone in jewelry. Topaz occurs in variety of natural colors and its color range has been extended by chemical or heat treatments of colorless Topaz.

Megalonyx—An Ice Age Monster of a Clawed Kind Presented at the November General Meeting by Howard Emry



My favorite vertebrate fossil is *Megalonyx* because of its unique form and the story of its initial discovery is as interesting as the animal itself.

The story of its discovery begins in America during the late 1790's. During that time several farm laborers went into a limestone cave located in Virginia in search of bat guano (dung). They knew that on the floor of the cave were large amounts of bat guano which contained saltpeter or potassium nitrate. In those days saltpeter was a primary ingredient used for making gun powder.

While excavating the dung deposits, the laborers also uncovered various skeletal remains of a large unknown animal. The remains included several large limb bones, numerous foot and toe bones and three huge claw bones. The strange bones, including the claws, were saved by the workers and later given to

Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States.

Jefferson analyzed the bones and focused his attention on the large claws. Based on the limited amount of evidence that was given him, Jefferson concluded that the bones belonged to a ferocious cat-like meat-eater, which he believed was three times bigger than the modern lion. He also said it was a monstrous mammal that had "phosphorous eyes" and a "lion-like roar". Because of the size of the claws, he named this creature "*Megalonyx*", meaning "great claw" in Greek.

This is when the story involved politics and national pride. During the late 1700's and early 1800's, most European governments regarded America as mostly a hostile wilderness populated mostly by uneducated settlers who the Europeans felt were inferior because Americans were not educated and guided by God-anointed kings and queens.

Not to be outdone by European scientists, Jefferson quickly wrote a paper on this unique Virginia find to show that North America had scientific discoveries as good, if not better, than any found in Europe or by European scientists.

In 1797, Jefferson decided to brag about his *Megalonyx* before the scientific world by reading his paper to the American Philosophical Society. However, several days before the society's meeting was held, Jefferson's bubble burst when he obtained a newly published report written by George Cuvier, a French zoologist who uncovered a fossil skeleton whose bones were like the modern tree sloth, only larger.

When Jefferson read Cuvier's report and saw drawings of the bones found by the French zoologist, Jefferson realized that his *Megalonyx* was a slow-moving ground sloth that ate plants and not a monstrous meat-eating lion. Jefferson reluctantly modified his paper saying that the bones found in the Virginia cave belonged to an animal of "the clawed kind", but did not say it had phosphorous eyes or a lion-like roar.

However, because Jefferson was the first to describe the cave discovery to science in 1825, the ground sloth was named *Megalonyx Jeffersonii* in honor of the president and it was commonly known as Jefferson's ground sloth.

Today, we know that *Megalonyx Jeffersonii* was about the size of an ox (8 to 10 feet long) and had a strong, muscular body similar to that of a bear. Based on its foot structure, this ground sloth was probably slow moving. It is believed that it lived in forests or woodland areas and browsed on leaves, twigs and perhaps small nuts. Its huge claws were probably used for defensive purposes and for stripping leaves and nuts off from tree branches.

As a postscript to this story, just before I graduated from Pocatello High School in the spring of 1964, I learned that Ice Age fossil bones could be found in certain areas on the beach of the American Falls Reservoir. This reservoir is located about 10 miles west of Pocatello, Idaho. From the fall of 1964 to the spring of 1971, I walked for miles along the shoreline of this reservoir searching for fossils of this Pleistocene Epoch. During that time, I managed to collect many isolated bones and teeth of Ice Age mammals such as camel, bison, horse, Mammoth, Mastodon, dire wolf, saber-tooth cat, and ground sloth, as well as others.

However, my greatest discovery at the reservoir was made in the spring of 1971 when I discovered a nearly complete skeleton of the *Megalonyx Jeffersonii* ground sloth. At that time it was the most complete skeleton of that species of ground sloth found in North America. Today, this ground sloth skeleton is housed at the Idaho State Museum of Natural History which is located on the Idaho State University campus in Pocatello.

After my ground sloth discovery from 1971 until about 1986, my wife Darlene and I continued our adventures as “bone hunters” by collecting and donating thousands of fossils from the American Falls Reservoir to the Idaho State Museum of Natural History in Pocatello.

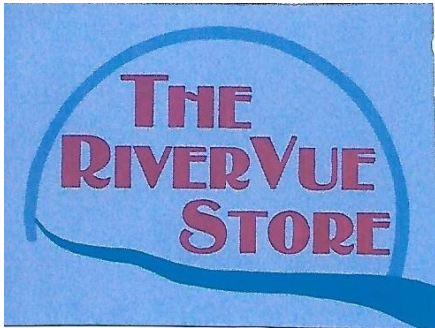

Community Corner

April of 2019, I volunteered to a post on FaceBook to educate four 7 yr old girls on simple rock identification at a birthday party. I taught the girls by engaging them in a treasure hunt for various rocks, discussing rock differences and playing rock identification games. I gave each participant a small rock collection. We took a field trip to Graveyard Point, OR, where everyone was thrilled to find agates to put in their buckets. The girls said they had a great time. This was a service I gave freely to help those that seem interested in rocks & minerals, and I discovered the adults were as engaged in the discussion as much as the kids.

Several months later a friend asked if I would give a class to her 9 yr. old son and a couple of his friends. So I fine-tuned my presentation and prepared more small rock collections. The collections consist of 1-2" pieces of vesicular basalt, granite, shale, agate, jasper, obsidian, quartz, sandstone, and various other easy to find rocks of Idaho.

Since that early beginning, as of Nov. 2021, I have given rock presentations to 47 kids (7-17) & 13 adults and have others coming soon. Participants are told "I am not a geologist but a self-taught petrologist and a retired elementary school librarian". I start with a discussion of how rocks are used in their everyday life...from brushing their teeth, to making their electronic devices, houses, cars, etc. Next, I show how rocks are formed using the analogy of the ingredients used in baking, the participants are then given a piece of granite and they choose the minerals ("ingredients") that make that particular rock (feldspar, quartz, muscovite/biotite, etc). They quickly see the mineral colors and textures inside the granite they are holding and most are amazed they "made" a rock. Then we talk about common Idaho rocks and how to identify them with help from magnifying glasses. I show them the common tools rockhounds use and where they can find "cool" rocks locally. The kids are encouraged to pick up any of my display rocks that interest them, all of which are labeled. If the presentation is at my home my husband will show them the various machines we have to cut and polish rocks and sometimes do a demonstration. This is a labor of love on my part and my reward is the delight of seeing the next generation find a love for things of the earth.
