# My Favorite—by Bob Bashford Petrified Wood

My favorite rock wasn't always a rock!

Many millions of years ago it was a tree, a bush, or some other vegetation.

And technically most petrified wood is actually a fossil.

It really just takes 3 things to create petrified wood...
a tree, mud to bury it in an environment that lacks oxygen to prevent decay,
water that is full of minerals to replace the cell structure by a process known as
petrification over millions of years.

Petrified wood can end up agatized, opalized, or silicatized by Quartz, Calcite, or other compounds.

The various colors have little to do with the color of the original wood, but mostly by the various minerals in the water.

Green or blue can be caused by Copper, Cobalt or Chromium

Pink from Manganese.

Black from Carbon.

Grey or white from Silica.

Red, Yellow, or Brown from Various Iron Oxides.

Most petrified wood will show some original structure like tree rings or bark, but not always.

Petrified wood can be found in many locations!

So, Petrified wood is my favorite "ROCK!"

If you ever get to Northern South Dakota be sure to visit Petrified Park, in Lemmon, SD. A full city block of Petrified Wood structures built in 1930-32.

# ALL FIELD TRIPS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE DEPENDING ON THE WEATHER AND ROAD CONDITIONS.

### **USEFUL ITEMS TO BRING ON YOUR TRIP**

Buckets, Shovels, Rock Hammer, Pick (Large and Small), Sieve, Gloves, Spray Bottle for Water, Small Scrub Brush, Knee Pads, Magnifier, Plenty of Drinking Water, Food,

Appropriate Clothing, Protective Eyewear, Sun Protection, Day Pack or Back Pack, Umbrella, Pry Bar, Tick Spray, First Aid Kit, Shovel and fire extinguisher to put out any fires that may start.

Trips can last most of the day. Generally, a High-Clearance vehicle and sometimes 4WD or an ATV is required. Remember, when you are finished, fill in all holes that are dug at the site.

Everyone went home with some beautiful material ranging from tumbler to sphere making size. There were even a few who found large enough pieces for some yard art. Several people wandered over to the fossil area and came up with some good specimens showing many of the fossilized structures through the material which was as soft as opal to as hard as Agate.

- The mineral **pyrite** or **iron pyrite**, also known as **fool's gold**, is an iron sulfide with the chemical formula <u>FeS</u><sub>2</sub> (iron (II) disulfide).
  - Pyrite is the most abundant sulfide mineral.
  - Pyrite has a nickname that has become famous "Fool's Gold."

    The mineral's gold color, metallic luster, and high specific gravity often cause it to be mistaken for gold by inexperienced prospectors.
    - Pyrite crystals are found all over the world.
    - Hardness— 6 to 6.5
    - Safe to handle.
  - Used in the early 1800's for faceted beads/jewelry.
    - Used in processing amber colored glass.
    - Provides UV protection and protects against blue light.
  - Used to provide longer life in brake pads, used in manufacturing cast iron, makes grinding wheels stronger.
  - 1. Pyrite Crystal—found all over the world (I found this one in CO.)
  - 2. Pyrite Crystal—found all over the world
  - Boji Stone— found only in Kansas
  - 4. The Sun —mostly found in Illinois

Formed in Narrow seams of slate interbedded in old coal deposits.


