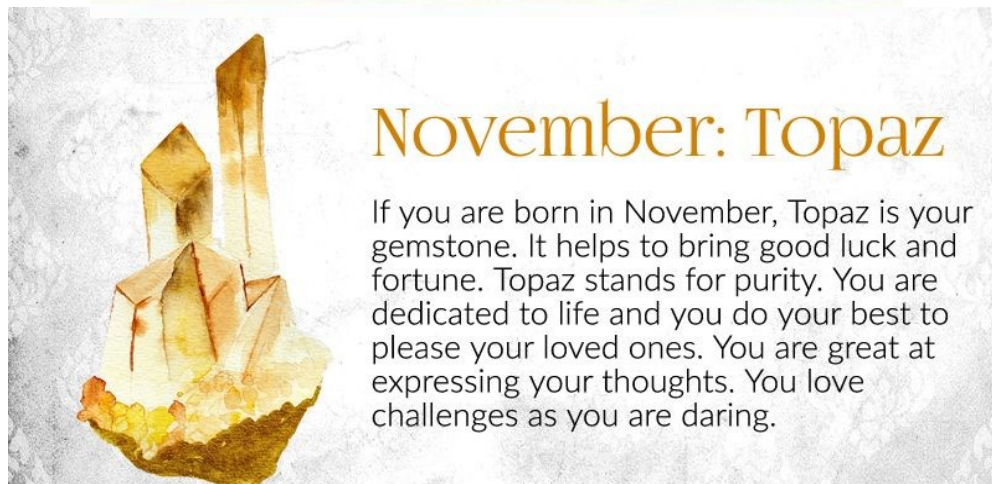
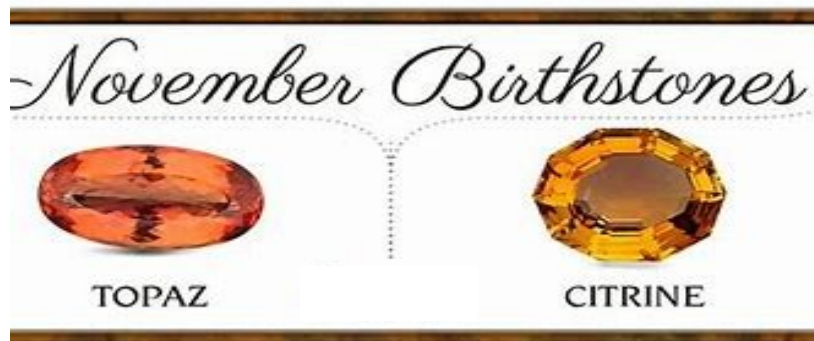

Board Meeting Minutes—October 28, 2024

Board Meeting Minutes—October 28, 2024. The Board Meeting was called to order at 7:03 pm by President, Willa Renken at Caldwell Public Library, 1010 Dearborn St., Caldwell, Idaho. The motion was made to accept the minutes as printed in the newsletter by Ed Moser; Kim Bashford seconded; motion passed. A discussion was held regarding the voting process at the October meeting. It was determined that the election procedures were not properly followed. President Willa Renken apologized profusely for the error and said it would be rectified at the November meeting. Kim will provide Ballots to be cast for the Secretary position between the two candidates and voted on by the club members in attendance at November's meeting.

As part of the tax return preparation, there was a discussion around payment of Sales Tax on revenue generated from the club show, slab drawings and auctions.

There was no Secretary's report as Chris Deveau was absent.

Vice President, Sue Cassidy advised that she was working on presentations for 2025 and that there are no speakers for the remainder of the year.

Treasurer, Ken Christensen gave a summary of all accounts.

There was no show report by Show Chair, Paul Deveau, however, he did turn in the keys for the OGMS trailers and indicated that he had a lot of OGMS show items at his house in Fruitland and had used his personal trailer to transport items at show time.

Willa indicated that newsletter articles needed to be into the Editor, Denise Stringer by this weekend. Also, Denise will be working with Robert Murphey as he takes over the newsletter for OGMS at the end of the year. They have yet to meet and review the process which should hopefully occur soon to allow for a smooth transition for 2025.

Federation Chair, Ed Moser, had nothing new to report on behalf of the Federation but advised that he would have the Caldwell Library showcases filled during the month of December, so stop by and see his wonderful collection.

Membership, Kim Bashford presented one new membership to the board: Aaron Battershell as well as two people for Lifetime membership: Eva Roberts, a 25-year member and Bob Bashford, a longtime active member. The motion to accept the new member and lifetime members was made by Ed Moser seconded by John Wright, the motion passed.

Kim reported that she had locked in our club meeting dates with the College of Idaho for 2025.

Christmas party: Kim confirmed that the meal will be \$9 per person (with the other half paid for by OGMS). Also, with the retirement of Bill Stringer, we would like to identify another existing Elks member or someone willing to become an Elks member. USEFUL ITEMS TO BRING ON YOUR FIELD TRIP

Buckets, Shovels, Rock Hammer, Pick (Large and Small), Sieve, Gloves, Spray Bottle for Water, Small Scrub Brush, Knee Pads, Magnifier, Plenty of Drinking Water, Food, Appropriate Clothing, Protective Eyewear, Sun Protection, Day Pack or Back Pack, Umbrella, Pry Bar, Tick Spray, First Aid Kit, Protective clothing and sunscreen to avoid burns.

Shovel and fire extinguisher to put out any fires that may start.

- Trips can last most of the day.
- Generally, a High-Clearance vehicle and sometimes 4WD or an ATV is required. Check with the Field Trip Chair before you go.
- Please remember to not park on tall grass or sagebrush as the fire season is in full swing and watch out for snakes.
- When you are finished, fill in all holes that are dug at the site.

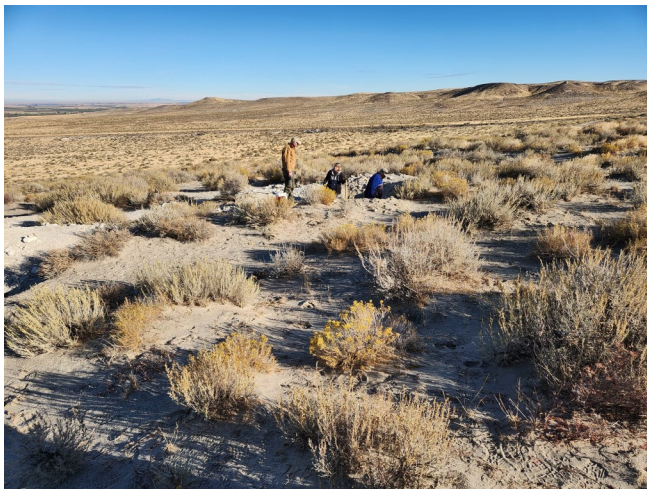

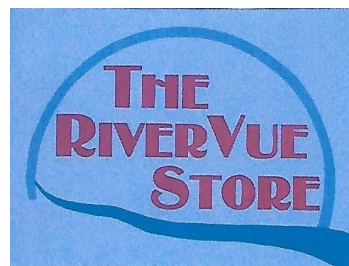

In Memoriam—William “Bill” Stringer

Lifetime Club Member

May 12, 1924 – November 6, 2024

William “Bill” Stringer passed away peacefully of natural causes on November 6, 2024.

Bill was born on May 12, 1924 near Parsons, Kansas to Elbert Harvey and Emma Alice Stringer. He attended schools near Parsons, Kansas and worked on farms in the area while growing up. As a youth and in the Navy, he was called by his nickname “Alf”.

Bill worked on the construction crew for the Kansas Ordinance Plant and also worked on the production lines there. He completed welding classes which led to a job at the Wichita Aircraft Machine Shop, and was also a clerk in the storage department at MKT Railroad.

In 1943, he enlisted with the United States Navy and attended boot camp at Farragut, Idaho. He trained in diesel motor maintenance in California, and was assigned to Amphibious Landing Craft in Coronado, California. He completed commando training at Camp Pendleton, and helped train Army 86th-92nd in amphibious landings at Morrow Bay. He was then assigned to the Cub 18 Navy 3912, the 3rd ship to land in Sasebo Harbor, Japan, after the atomic bomb that ended World War II. He was honorably discharged in April 1946 as a Motor Machinist’s Mate second class, and returned home to Kansas.

While having pie and coffee at a restaurant in Erie, Kansas, he met the love of his life, Anna Mae Lewis. She was his waitress and served him an extra big piece of pie. Bill and Anna were married on December 17, 1948, in Bentonville, Arkansas, and were married almost 64 years until her death in October 2012.

Bill and Anna tried their luck at farming, but it was very hard in Kansas, so Bill worked for the MKT Railroad until they closed operations in Parsons, Kansas. He and Anna moved their family to Nampa, Idaho in 1957 where he worked for the Union Pacific Railroad at the Boise Depot and then as a Yard Office Clerk at the Nampa Depot. He retired in 1985. Bill and Anna enjoyed living in Nampa and raised five children there.

Bill and Anna operated Stringer’s Gem Shop in Nampa from 1978, and Bill finally closed the shop in 2024. Bill enjoyed helping new rockhounds get started and teaching people how to use lapidary equipment and metal detectors. He skillfully worked rock specimens into works of art. His favorite rocks to work were Idaho Fire Opal and Owyhee Picture Jasper.

Bill and Anna were active in several organizations. They helped charter the National Association of Retired and Veterans Railway (NARVE) Unit No. 82 of which Bill was President and Anna was Treasurer. They were members of Gem Sprouts Good Sam Club, the Nampa Elks Lodge #1389, and life members of Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) of Parsons, Kansas. They attended St. Paul’s Catholic Church in Nampa, where all five of their children attended grade school. Bill and Anna were Lifetime Members of the Owyhee Gem & Mineral Society, and served in Board positions, including Show Chairs, Bill as President and Anna as Secretary and Newsletter Editor.

Bill loved to take care of his garden, fruit trees, and lawn. He had quite the green thumb. Bill also loved to hunt and fish in Kansas and Idaho. Bill and Anna enjoyed fishing, rock hunting, dancing at The Elks, traveling in their R.V., and spent several winters in Arizona. They traveled through Europe and enjoyed taking cruises.

Bill was an amazing father and loved taking care of his family. Bill and Anna have five children, Lawrence (Eva) Stringer, Meridian, ID; Douglas (Gail) Stringer, Union City, CA; Sandra (Tim) Merrick, Boise, ID; Steve Stringer, San Diego, CA; Denise Stringer, Boise, ID. They have 13 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren, and several great-great-grandchildren.

Bill was preceded in death by his parents, his wife Anna; brothers Eugene, Lloyd (Art), Leonard, James (Jay), and Samuel; sisters Lillian and Leona; a grandson, Loren Van; and a daughter-in-law, Joan.

Rockhounds' Code of Ethics

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.
- I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- I will discard no burning material – matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.
